1855 Neue Zionsharfe Found





for a translation of the note handwritten in German inside the book as return payment. (See translation below.)

This book is the oldest known copy of our beloved hymnal.

Field Trip Leads to Appreciation for our Heritage

Students from Cornerstone School in Wolcott, IN, visited the Heritage Center last May as part of their Heritage of Faith class. Also stopping at various churches and cemeteries, they located the graves of Benedict Weyeneth, Joseph Bella, and G.M. Mangold as part of their trip. The school's spring newsletter stated, "Touring the Heritage Center Foundation in Fairbury, IL was unanimously voted as the most worthwhile aspect of our excursion. This center houses many relics pertaining to the Apostolic faith that have been passed down through the generations, such as handwritten Zion's Harp hymnals, 150-year-old veils from the original Croghan/Naumburg, NY churches, original letters written by G.M. Mangold, and much more. Copies of nearly every Silver Lining issue were present, and we enjoyed browsing through them and reading about important events from the past. The field trip greatly benefited each of us. It allowed the material we've studied to come alive and caused us to acquire a higher appreciation for our faith."

An Evening of History and Heritage

August 2015 marked 50 years that the Fairbury congregation has been worshiping in its current building. An evening of remembering their history and heritage was held in the fellowship hall with singing, a slide presentation, an archive display, and a snack which included bread with butter and sugar.

The slide presentation included pictures of the old church, of their building the current church, of various additions, and of the brethren on the building committee and ministers who have served in the current church. Many of the pictures in the presentation have been made into a memory book and will soon be available for viewing in the Heritage Center.

The archive display included the baptismal from the South Side church, the blueprints from the current church, kitchen items and china, a reel-to-reel tape player, a pulpit Bible and hymnals, veils and hats, old Sunday school materials, and small toys children used to play with during services.

Although much of the evening was spent talking about memories of building the church and of using the

various items from the past, the real focus was on an appreciation of the heritage that has been passed down by faithful brethren and the need to continue to hold fast to the faith and doctrine that has been preserved since

Díd you know...

Originally, in the 1870s, the Lamont and Gridley, Kansas, congregations were one church body. The brethren met at a school centrally located between the two areas. Eventually travel became too inconvenient, and they separated into two distinct congregations. The Kansas brethren faced coyote and wolf packs, Indians, and roaming buffalo during those early days. In 1995, the brethren were once again united into the Lamont-Gridley church.

Besides his duties as elder and minister, he was also instrumental in translating many of the *Zion's Harp* hymns from German into English. This booklet contains Ernest Graf's autobiography and some of his letters, sermons, and doctrinal writings. It also includes his funeral service and a memorial poem written by Henry Beer. This collection was compiled to share the wisdom and spiritual insight of a dear elder brother for the benefit of all who appreciate our blessed heritage. Printing of this writing is expected by early 2016.
