New Display Cases

The Heritage Center Foundation would like to humbly thank the generous donors who helped make it possible to purchase a set of glass display cases. Many old, fragile books and materials can now be viewed by visitors to the Heritage Center. Included in this case are eight Zion's Harps in order of publication; Zion's Harps and Bibles from Europe, including one with a cover made from bone and a first edition Hungarian Zion's Harp published in 1866; a metal printing plate; a notebook with a



handwritten German translation of Samuel Froehlich's writings; and vintage veils from Croghan-Naumburg, the first Apostolic Christian Church in America.

HERITAGE OF FAITH CHURCH HISTORY COURSE

Now available from the Heritage Center Foundation is a great tool for those interested in learning about the development of the Apostolic Christian Church from its inception. Written at a junior high/high school level, this 45 lesson course gives an overview of Christian history from the time of Christ to the present, with an emphasis on Apostolic Christian Church history. Each of the ten units is complete with Objectives, Lesson Plans, Quizzes, Teaching Helps, Vocabulary, Maps, and Time Lines. It is intended for private school and home school use, but is also suitable for a variety of settings. Developed by a team of Apostolic Christian brethren including educators and historians, the course is continually being improved. REQUEST FOR RECORDS AND REEL TO REEL SERMONS

The Heritage Center continues to collect sermons of deceased ministers in both printed and audio formats. Audio sermons recorded onto records and magnetic tape media continue to deteriorate every day. The Heritage Center hopes to better preserve these old sermons by converting them to a digital format. Once in a digital format, the audio can then be formatted to improve the sound quality and reduce or eliminate the background noise. The Center would like the opportunity to borrow any records or reel to reel sermon tapes that you may be able to find. Arrangements can be made to pick up the records or reels, which will be returned with a digital copy.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Peoria church has graciously agreed to allow the Heritage Center to copy the church's vast collection of sermon cassette tapes. This collection includes sermons from many different congregations and includes several thousand tapes. Volunteers are needed to play these sermons into a computer so they can be digitized and formatted. No technical computer experience is required, but a computer with a USB or "line in" port would be helpful. The Heritage Center will be able to supply the software, connecting cable, and tape player. A tape player with an "auto reverse" feature works best as the player can record and switch sides automatically without the need for the operator to be present.

Helping to record these sermons could be a good wintertime project for Brothers, Sisters, and friends of all ages, while helping to preserve our precious heritage. Training and set up will be provided.

A selection from history

The following words were spoken at the Eureka church dedication service by Bro. David Mangold on **July 28, 1957**:

It seems like that servant of God, who wrote that song, [Psalm 62], felt or imagined that he had much opposition, that he was being assailed, but he spoke the wonderful words which God gave him - "I shall not be greatly moved." And when every member of the church, when every child of God will stand on their feet and realize that he should not be greatly moved; that we should abide; we should remain in that precious faith unto which we've been called; and as the brother also mentioned, when changing times are mentioned to us we should very carefully consider what we'd do to meet those changing times. It is true the times do bring problems, and we believers also have to reckon with that fact: but as the brother mentioned: as the word of God told us, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever." And in this present time, where so many are crying, "Here is Christ, and there is Christ," we can only repeat and say, "As ye have found the Lord, and where you have found Him, there remain." That is the teaching of God's word.
